C Countries & cultures Länder & Kulturen

Das englische Wort *friend* hat nicht immer die gleiche Bedeutung wie das deutsche Wort ‚Freund‘. *Friend* wird im Englischen viel häufiger benutzt, auch für relativ flüchtige Bekanntschaften. Eine Umfrage hat ergeben, dass der Durchschnittsengländer 37 *friends* hat, während der Durchschnittsdeutsche nur fünf Freunde angibt! Fragt man nach, stellt man fest, dass der Begriff inhaltlich anders besetzt ist, sodass Mitleid mit den scheinbar kontaktarmen Deutschen überflüssig wäre.

Im Englischen werden auch Nachbarn und Kollegen als Freunde bezeichnet. In britischen Betrieben geht man mit Kollegen oft nach der Arbeit kurz ins Pub und tauscht auch Privates aus. Das Verhältnis unter Kollegen in deutschen Firmen kommt Briten daher oft distanziert vor. Auch Urlaubsbekanntschaften werden als *friends* bezeichnet und sogar Menschen, die man bei einem Pub-Besuch kennengelernt hat! Während man in Deutschland zuerst den Familiennamen austauscht, nennt man in englischsprachigen Ländern beim Kennenlernen oft nur den Vornamen. Deshalb finden manche Engländer, dass man jemanden sehr gut kennen muss, um seinen bzw. ihren Familiennamen zu kennen!
