Groceries, going (food) shopping, ordering in a restaurant

Adjectives and adverbs

knick-knacks: small objects which people keep as ornaments or toys, rather than for a particular use

greengrocer: a shop or person who sells fruit and vegetables

hospitality: the friendly reception and entertainment of guests

custard: a sweet sauce made with milk and eggs

market stall: a stand or booth where goods are sold in a market

promptly: done without delay; immediately
