‘Isn’t it beautiful, darling?’ says Sarah. She smiles at the man beside her. His name is Ethan.

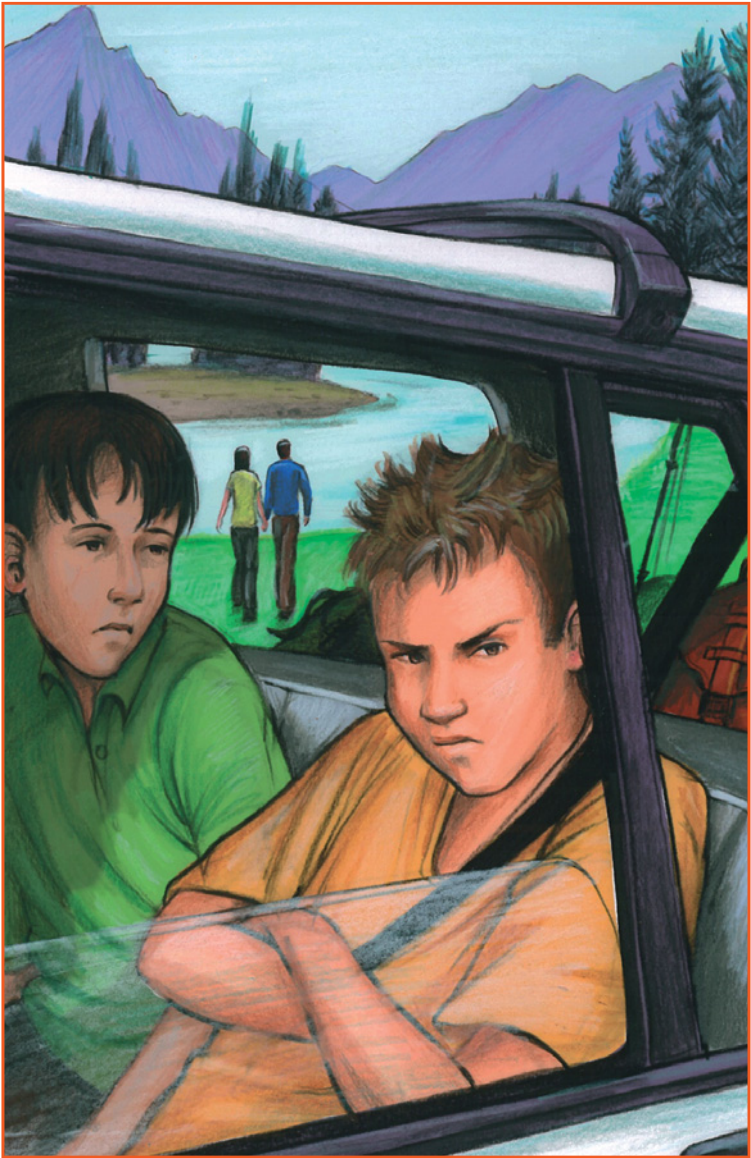
‘Yes, it is beautiful, darling,’ Ethan says to Sarah. ‘We’re going to have a good time here.’
